1.5 INTENDED USE OF CANINE

- SELLER is aware the CANINE is being purchased as a WORKING CANINE and must thus exhibit a balanced high level of drive, courage, confidence, obedience and trainability.

1.6 FULL DISCLOSURE

- SELLER shall disclose to the BUYER any and all incidents of aggression by the CANINE on other dogs, animals or humans, that resulted in injury or death.
- This disclosure must be done in writing, as an Addendum to this contract.
- Failure by the SELLER to disclose these incidents to the BUYER may result in cancellation of this contract, and a reimbursement of all fees and expenses.
- If the SELLER is unaware of the CANINES history, this needs to be disclosed to the BUYER as part of the Addendum.

1.7 ORIGIN

1.8 TRANSFER DATE/TIME

For the purposes of this contract, the TRANSFER DATE/TIME will be the Date and Time the Canine arrives at the BUYERS Training Facility, located at 4640 E Forest Pleasant Place, Cave Creek AZ 85331 USA

1.9 OWNERSHIP

- Ownership of the CANINE shall transfer to the BUYER at the TRANSFER DATE/TIME. During transit, ownership and responsibilities for the CANINE shall rest with the SELLER.
- If for any reason CANINE is not received by BUYER, all monies paid, including shipping, shall be returned to BUYER.

1.10 EXAMINATION PERIOD

For the purposes of this contract, the EXAMINATION PERIOD will commence from the TRANSFER (Date and Time), not including weekends or public holidays.

The SELLER agrees to provide the BUYER with an EXAMINATION PERIOD of 72 (seventy-two) hours, from TRANSFER DATE/TIME.

1.11 EXAMINATION OF CANINE

- The SELLER agrees the BUYER has up to 72 (Seventy-two) hours from TRANSFER to have the CANINE examined by a board certified veterinarian of

the BUYERS choice. This Medical Examination includes, but is not limited to, physical exams, blood tests, x-rays, neurological scans, ultrasounds, fecals, etc.

- Costs of the Medical Examination will be borne by the BUYER.
- The SELLER further agrees the BUYER has up to 72 (Seventy-two) hours from TRANSFER to conduct a Partners Working Dog Capabilities & Wellness Evaluation (PWDCWE) (See separate section)
- Costs of the PWDCWE will be borne by the BUYER.
- Should any irregularities be found during testing the BUYER may request an additional 48 (Forty eight) hours for further testing.

1.12 DOCUMENTATION

- SELLER shall provide all registration and relevant documentation on the above canine to the BUYER at time of delivery.
- SELLER shall provide current vaccination records of canine at time of delivery
- If dog is being transferred internationally, SELLER shall provide at SELLER expense a current HEALTH CERTIFICATE, issued by a board certified veterinarian. The facility issuing the certificate shall be clearly stated, with an address and phone number of the issuing veterinarian.
- The SELLER shall provide copies of X-rays (obtained less than sixty (60) days from the date of delivery) of the pelvis and hip area and the elbows of each forelimb shall be made available to the BUYER. These can be provided electronically.
- The SELLER shall provide copies of OFA radiograph certifications, if available.
- The SELLER shall provide copies of the Country of Origin registration papers.
- The SELLER shall transfer ownership of the canine to the BUYER within 7 days of delivery, through completion of the registration papers.
- The SELLER shall provide ANY and ALL scorebooks from trials or competitions of the CANINE, regardless of the results achieved.
- Failure to disclose all TRIALS entered and / or competed in may be grounds for termination of this contract.
- The SELLER shall provide a three generation pedigrees of the canine
- If available, the SELLER shall provide all Breed surveys and other proof of lineage

2 GUARANTEES

2.1 72 HOUR GUARANTEE

- If during the 72-hour Examination Period, circumstances are found which disqualify the CANINE, the CANINE will be returned as follows:
- The BUYER will RETURN the canine at the SELLERS expense
- The SELLER will offer a FULL refund of the PURCHASE PRICE and the SHIPPING costs
- If both the SELLER and the BUYER agree, other arrangements can be made.

2.2 30 DAY GUARANTEE

- If during the first 30 (thirty) days of training, any serious situations arise that disqualify the dog from training, the SELLER has the option of:
- Option 1 - Replacing the CANINE with a similar canine at the SELLERS expense.
- Option 2 - Refunding 75% of the PURCHASE PRICE
- Discounting a NEW CANINE by 50% of the PURCHASE PRICE.

2.3 ONE YEAR GUARANTEE

- If during the first year after transfer, the CANINE displayed any genetic issue that disqualifies the CANINE from working use:
- The BUYER will provide medical proof of the condition to the SELLER
- Option 1 - The SELLER will refund 50% of the original purchase price
- Option 2 - The SELLER shall replace the CANINE, with shipping at the BUYERS expense, with another suitable candidate.
- The CANINE shall be returned to the SELLER, or alternative arrangements made.

4 PARTNERS WORKING DOG CAPABILITIES & WELLNESS EVALUATION

PART A - WELLNESS EVALUATION

4.1 INTRODUCTION

- The purpose of the Partners Working Dogs – Capabilities & Wellness Evaluation (PWD-CWE) is to ensure the highest possible working capabilities for our canines.
- All CANINES accepted into the training program will undergo an evaluation within 72 hours of arrival.
- At the time of purchase CANINE must be medically able to enter training.
- SELLERS should be aware of the BUYERS requirements for a WORKING canine, and need to fully disclose ANY and ALL issues that could negatively impact the CANINES working abilities or performance PRIOR to shipping or delivery.

4.2 GENERAL

- SELLER warrants the CANINE is in excellent health with no acute or chronic disease or condition, which could either hamper their ability to perform, or would be excessively costly to treat.

4.3 COMMUNICABLE OR CONTAGIOUS DISEASE

- IMPORTANT NOTE!
- SELLER is required to disclose if the CANINE has been exposed to or had contact with any communicable or contagious disease, such as, but not limited to, PARVO, DISTEMPER, RABIES, etc., within 60 days prior to transfer.
- FAILURE TO DISCLOSE will result in legal action against the SELLER.

4.4 HEIGHT AND WEIGHT

- Height and weight must be proportional to the canine's frame and skeletal size.
- Severely overweight or underweight canines will not be accepted.
- No canine shall weigh less than forty (40) pounds
- No canine shall weigh more than ninety (90) pounds.

4.5 RADIOGRAPHS

- The SELLER shall provide radiographs of hips and elbows, at SELLERS expense.
- The SELLER shall obtain OFA or similar certification, and provide to the BUYER.
- The BUYER may conduct further radiographs, at BUYERS expense.
- All radiographs must have minimum data imprinted (“flashed”) permanently on the radiograph at the time of exposure.
- This will include canine identification (name, tattoo/brand number, and/or microchip number), whelping date (or age at time of radiographic examination), and date of examination.

4.6 GAIT

- CANINE must display normal mobility at a walk and run.
- Canines are disqualified for any gait abnormality, which could affect the canine’s ability to perform normal duties.

4.7 SKIN AND COAT

- Skin and coat must be healthy in appearance, displaying no evidence of chronic dermatitis, allergies, infections, injuries or marked external parasite infestation (e.g., ticks, mange, fleas, etc.).
- A matted, unthrifty hair-coat may not be grounds for disqualification but will raise concern about the canine’s general health.

4.8 TEETH AND JAWS

- SELLER warrants the CANINE has a normal dentition and dental occlusion.
- A overshot or undershot jaws is a disqualifier.
- Oral infection or excessive periodontal disease may be grounds for disqualifying a canine.
- Broken teeth or excessively worn teeth may be disqualifying.

4.9 HEART AND LUNGS

- SELLER warrants the CANINE has a normal heart sound, rate and rhythm with no murmurs, arrhythmia or other issues that could impact work.
- The cardiovascular and respiratory system must be normal at rest and upon exercise.
- Current heartworm disease is disqualifying.

4.10 LIMBS AND JOINTS

- Any condition of the bones, joints or muscles that might hamper or restrict the normal performance of duty is grounds for disqualification.
- Examples include:

4.10.1 HIP DYSPLASIA AND ELBOW DYSPLASIA.

- A malformation of the hip and elbow joints, respectively, which usually results in degenerative joint disease, arthritis and chronic lameness.
- Radiographic evidence of hip dysplasia or elbow dysplasia or degenerative joint disease will disqualify a canine.

4.10.2 FRACTURES

- Fractures which are unhealed, are disqualifying.
- Healed fractures resulting in significant bone or joint conformation changes or lameness are disqualifying.

4.10.3 LIGAMENTS

- Ligament damage, osteoarthritis, etc., of the limb joints is disqualifying.

4.10.4 SPINAL

- Transitional vertebrae of the caudal lumbar spine, lumbosacral junction or sacrum may be disqualifying.
- Asymmetric pelvic attachment is also disqualifying.

4.11 NERVOUS SYSTEM AND BASIC SENSES

- SELLER warrants the CANINE has a normal nervous system, with no symptoms or indications of neurological disorders.
- Any defect in the nervous system, to include the basic senses of vision, hearing and sense of smell, is disqualifying.
- Examples include, but are not limited to, opacities of the cornea, eyelid deformities, cataracts, retinal degeneration, chronic otitis, acute or chronic rhinitis/sinusitis and spinal disease.
- SELLER must disclose if any of the above nervous system or neurological conditions exist in either of the parents of the CANINE.

4.12 HEARTWORM

- SELLER warrants that CANINE is free of heartworm infection (*Dirofilaria immitis*).

- The presence of heartworm infection will be determined by using a heartworm antigen test.
- A negative heartworm concentration test (filtration or Knott's) is not sufficient evidence to declare the animal heartworm-free.

4.13 INTESTINAL PARASITISM

- Infection with intestinal parasites (roundworms, hookworms, tapeworms, etc.) may not be disqualifying, depending on the level of infection and the overall condition of the animal.
- Presence of intestinal parasites is, however, an indication of poor care and will raise concern about the canine's general health.

4.14 EXTERNAL PARASITISM.

- Presence of fleas, ticks, lice or mange mites may not be disqualifying, depending on the amount of infestation, the degree of associated skin disease, and the overall condition of the canine.
- Presence of external parasites is, however, an indication of poor care and will raise concern about the canine's general health.

4.15 IMMUNIZATION

- CANINE must have been vaccinated within the previous 12 months for rabies, canine distemper, canine adenovirus (TYPE 2), coronavirus, parainfluenza, parvovirus and leptospirosis.
- A vaccination certificate with individual canine identification (name, procurement number, DNA registration, tattoo or microchip #) must be provided.
- SELLER shall provide copies of all documentation, reports and records, from date of birth to time of transfer to BUYER.

4.16 REPRODUCTIVE AND URINARY SYSTEM

- SELLER must disclose any congenital or conformational abnormality.
- These are considered disqualifying, especially if the defect requires long-term medical treatment or results in a shortened working life of the canine.
- Cryptorchidism may not be disqualifying, unless the retained testicle results in medical complications not treatable by simple orchidectomy.
- A juvenile vulva resulting in urine scalding is disqualifying.

4.17 COMMON MEDICALLY-DISQUALIFYING CONDITIONS

- Hematological abnormalities consistent with severe parasitism, infection, or metabolic disease.
- Poor body condition, either emaciation or obesity.
- Severe periodontal disease.
- Severe, non-resolving or intractable otitis externa or dermatitis.
- Radiographic signs of hip or elbow dysplasia or radiographic evidence of degenerative joint disease.
- Previous musculoskeletal injury which has or may lead to degenerative joint disease or conformational abnormality.

5 PARTNERS WORKING DOG CAPABILITIES & WELLNESS EVALUATION

PART B - WORKING CAPABILITIES EVALUATION

5.1 INTRODUCTION

The CANINE will be evaluated within 72 hours of arrival at the training center for its Working Capabilities.

The following is a summary of this Evaluation, and will be used to determine the working capabilities of the canine. This evaluation may also include additional testing or screening, at the discretion of the tester.

Final scoring of the canine is based on a weighted scoring system. While there are some requirements that MUST be a PASS, other observations are considered on a case-by-case basis.

5.2 CANINE GOOD CITIZEN TEST (CGC)

- All CANINES enrolled in the Partners Working Dog program are REQUIRED to pass an American Kennel Club (AKC), Canine Good Citizen (CGC) test.
- This test must be conducted by an AKC approved evaluator, according to AKC guidelines.

5.3 AMERICAN TEMPERAMENT TEST SOCIETY (ATTS)

All CANINES enrolled in the Partners Working Dog program are REQUIRED to pass an American Temperament Test Society (ATTS). This organization promotes the uniform temperament evaluation of all purebred and mixed breed dogs.

- Behavior towards strangers
- Reaction to Auditory Stimuli
- Reaction to Visual Stimuli
- Reaction to Tactile Stimuli
- Self protective Reaction
- This test must be conducted by an ATTS approved evaluator, according to ATTS guidelines.

5.4 STABLE CHARACTER TEST

- The canine will be brought around several people to judge how it responds.

- It should not be afraid or act aggressively toward anyone who approaches it; a happy, social attitude should be seen in its behavior.
- The canine will be walked on smooth tile floors to see if it is sure-footed.
- The canine should display no fear or discomfort.
- While the canine is standing or walking on leash in a passive state, an umbrella will be opened suddenly in its face.
- The canine may show a slight startled reaction but should recover quickly.
- The canine will be taken into tight places to see how it responds. It should confidently enter and investigate these areas without hesitation.

5.5 ODOR DETECTION TEST

- Canines should show an ability to use their olfactory senses over sight.
- Canines should identify odor, and show an interest in “searching”.
- Canines formerly trained in any AGGRESSIVE odor alerts (versus PASSIVE) alerts, are not generally acceptable, but may be considered.
- Canines that have been FAILED out of a law enforcement or military training program for failing to recognize, respond or alert, may be considered, but must pass scrutiny for trainability.

5.6 GUNFIRE TEST

- Canine must be comfortable, but aware, around gunfire.
- The canine will be tested for gun sureness with several unusually loud gunshots fired from about 50 feet behind it in which the canine should show little or no reaction.
- They can display interest, and may even alert, but must remain calm.
- A .22 up to a 9 mm may be used for this test.

5.7 OBSTACLES

- Canines must be mentally willing to surmount difficult physical obstacles
- Canine must be physically able to navigate obstacle training
- Canine must be able to handle heights without stress.
- Canines must be able to complete MES (Minimum Enrollment Standards) within 72 hours of arrival.
- Canines are not required to complete (Standard Operating Standards) until 30 days into training, but must display an ability to learn
- All canines must be capable of completing all obstacles within 60 days.

5.8 LIST OF BASIC OBSTACLES & MINIMUM STANDARDS

Canine must be able to complete Minimum Enrollment Standards (MAS) within 72 hours of arrival.

- Frame MES - Scale a four foot high A-frame
- Bridge MES - Walk across a bridge 24 inches wide
- Ladder MES - Climb an open rung, 72 inch high ladder
- Hurdles MES - Clear a fixed hurdle 24 inches high
- Jump MES - Clear a course of six dislodgeable jumps of 24 inches
- Long jump MES - Clear a long jump of four feet
- Tunnel MES - Walk through a 20-24 inch tunnel
- Wall MES - Scale a fixed wall of 4 feet high
- Window MES - Jump through a window of 18 inches high
- Crawl MES - Crawl under an obstacle set at 24 inches
- Table MES – Climb onto a 36x36 table, and sit or down
- Hoop MES – (Not required)
- Weave MES – (Not required)

5.9 SURFACE TEST

It is required that the canine be able to walk or work on a variety of surfaces without showing distress or insecurity.

Examples of these are:

- Paving
- Grass
- Tile
- Wood
- Granite (Dirt)
- Tarp
- Plastic sheeting
- Metal sheeting
- Metal Grate
- Conveyer belt (Baggage movers)
- Non-slip rubberized surface

5.10 RETRIEVE PLAY TEST

- A detection canine candidate shall exhibit an obsession to play with objects

- NO commands will be given for the canine to retrieve.
- They must be able to retrieve objects visible as well as hidden from view
- Canines may be required to retrieve on elevated unstable surface such as a moving conveyer belt
- Canines should prefer to play with objects more than having food or water
- Canines must prefer objects over the attention of the handler

5.11 RETRIEVAL PREY DRIVE TEST.

- The canine will be evaluated to see if it will pursue not only objects it is familiar with, but also strange, hard and soft objects.
- This test will be conducted in a ravine or on a hill. The canine, handler, and evaluator will stand downhill and the handler will throw each object uphill and out-of-sight. With each object, the canine will be held on-line and will be released with no command.
- One by one, several objects, familiar and strange, will be thrown uphill for the canine to pursue.
- The canine will be judged on its alertness, speed, hunt and grab of each object. The purpose is to determine if the canine will hunt for and play with strange objects while being physically stressed.
- Examples of strange objects are a piece of PVC pipe, a block of wood, a piece of metal pipe, aluminum can, etc.
- The canine's behavior in this test will be assessed against the following ideal behavior:

5.11.1 ALERTNESS.

- The canine should show undistracted interest when presented with each object and pull hard against the leash as the object is being thrown.

5.11.2 SPEED

- Upon being released, the canine should demonstrate extreme physical effort in running to the area where the object fell.

5.11.3 HUNT

- Upon reaching the area, the canine must show effective use of its olfactory senses in locating the object.
- The canine should show more focus on using olfactory rather than visual senses in searching

5.11.4 GRAB

- Upon locating the object, the canine should immediately grab it in its mouth and show a desire and satisfaction in playing with the object.
- The canine should preferably return to the handler with the object
- If the canine leaves the area with the object, this is a cause for concern
- Upon giving up “done” the object, the canine should show an intense drive to again want to search for the object

5.12 PERSEVERANCE TEST

- The canine will be pre-stimulated with an object that will then be placed under a heavy object (cement block, tire, etc.).
- The canine will then be released.
- The canine will be evaluated on its drive and desire to work out the problem and obtain the object.
- The purpose is to determine whether the canine possesses a sufficient desire to work to obtain the object and to determine the canine’s natural indication behavior (passive/aggressive).
- Ideal behavior for this test is, upon reaching the location of the object, the canine immediately engages in frantic biting and scratching behavior in an effort to dig and obtain the object, or a frozen stare at the location of the object.

5.13 WATER CONFLICT TEST

- After the retrieve/prey test, the canine will be taken to a location where there will be a small pond, stream or container of water.
- The canine will be shown the water and pre-stimulated with the object that will be thrown beyond the water.
- The canine will then be released.
- The ideal behavior is that the canine goes directly to the object without stopping to take a drink.

5.14 FOOD CONFLICT TEST

- A test similar to the water conflict will be conducted with food.
- The canine will be pre-stimulated with the object that is then thrown downwind of the food.
- The canine will then be released.

- The desired behavior is that the canine disregards the food and pursues the object.

5.15 HANDLER/OBJECT CONFLICT TEST

- The canine will be brought to a location where there will be a six-foot high chain link fence or an overturned milk crate or like item.
- The canine will be pre-stimulated with an object that will be placed behind the fence or under the milk crate.
- The canine will then be released and the handler will walk out of sight.
- The canine should go to the object, show keen interest and remain unaffected by the absence of the handler.

5.16 HUNT DRIVE TEST

- The canine will be brought to a location where there will be a high degree of grass or brush.
- The canine will be pre-stimulated with an object, which will be thrown deep (over 40 yards) into the grass or brush.
- The purpose is to determine the level of the canine's hardness in pushing through the brush and if the canine will search for an extended period of time without losing interest.
- The ideal behavior for this test is that the canine crashes through the brush with maximum physical effort.
- Once in the brush, the canine must exhibit concentrated and frantic hunting behavior utilizing its olfactory senses.
- The canine is expected to maintain this behavior for an extended period (4 to 5 minutes) without any assistance from the handler until such time as it locates the object.
- Upon locating the object, the canine should immediately grab the object in its mouth and demonstrate satisfaction in playing with it.

5.17 ON-LINE SEARCH TEST

- The canine will be brought to a search area (shelves, vehicles, building, etc.).
- The canine will then be pre-stimulated with an object that will be placed out of sight in the search area at a location above ground level.
- The canine will then be directed through a systematic search of the area on a leash. Included in this search will be several areas above waist level.

- The purpose is to determine the degree of trainability and handler sensitivity in the canine.
- Ideal behavior for this test is that the canine will follow all directional commands and signals made by the handler.
- The canine must demonstrate effective use of its olfactory senses in searching the area where it is directed.
- Upon reaching the hidden object, the canine should show quick recognition of the object's odor and display an undistracted desire to follow this odor and obtain the object.

5.18 TEMPERAMENT

- Throughout the selection phase, the canine must show that it possesses the temperament and genetic drives to work.

5.19 SOCIALIZATION.

- The canine must possess a sound temperament that will allow it to be approached by and work around groups of people without showing fear, distraction or reacting aggressively.
- A canine that shows fear, apprehension or insecurity will be removed from training.
- The canine must show an ability to work efficiently around environmental stressors, such as dogs, crowds or noise.
- The canine must show an ability to focus on the task at hand, while in a high stress environment.

5.20 COURAGE/CONFIDENCE

The canine must display lack of fear and not be distracted by the following situations and environments:

- Unsure footing (slick floors, rubble, etc.)
- Tightly enclosed spaces
- Moving vehicles
- Loud noises (weapons fire, etc.)
- Other live animals and their odors
- Startling situations (unforeseen events which the canine perceives as a danger)

5.21 SELF PRESERVATION INSTINCTS

- The canine should always display a willingness to bond and work with the handler.
- The canine should NOT show an emphasis for self-preservation or gratification, as this would indicate an aloof or selfish attitude.

5.22 DRIVES

- The canine shall possess, in varying degrees, the following genetic drives (drives are defined as subconscious impulses to react to stimuli):

5.22.1 HUNT.

- The drive to search for thrown objects utilizing all senses.

5.22.2 AIR SCENT.

- The drive to use its olfactory capability to search for and locate thrown or hidden objects.

5.22.3 PREY.

- The drive to chase, pick up and play with all thrown objects (hard or soft).

5.22.4 RETRIEVE.

- The drive to bring thrown object back to the handler.

5.22.5 ACTIVITY.

- The drive to be constantly in motion, engaged in activity and possessing abundant energy (commonly referred to as “hyper”).

5.22.6 TRAINABILITY.

- Happily and willingly follows handler directions.

6 LEGAL
